

#### A New Partnership

The Fall of 2020 marks the beginning of a new partnership with the National Repertory Orchestra (NRO) and the University of Northern Colorado (UNCO). For the month of September, I, Brittney Geurink, B.M. Instrumental Performance at the University of Northern Colorado, am working with the NRO as their first post-summer season intern. The internship focuses primarily on marketing, development, and operations.

The University of Northern Colorado offers a Bachelor's in Music- Business Emphasis degree which allows students to develop skills, concepts, and sensitivity essential to the professional life of a musician, combining entrepreneurship and musicianship. As a viola performance major, I never thought an internship would be possible, but since I took music business courses at UNCO, a door opened with the NRO.
